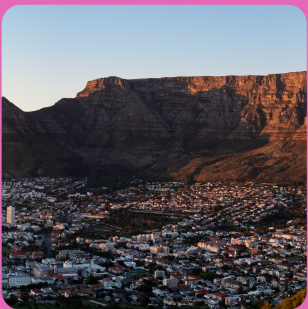


RESFEBER LOVES

1. Cape Town is the main gateway to Western Cape in South Africa and we highly recommend a stay on the Cape Peninsula. The towns here are smaller, quieter and you really do feel like you are part of South African life, rather than a tourist.



2. Camp's Bay is probably the most popular and busiest tourist destination on the Cape Peninsular, due to it's close proximity to Cape Town. The promenade is full of bars, restaurants and shops all over looking the sandy beaches and Atlantic coastline. Nestled in the back drop of Table Mountain this place is super popular with the domestic and international markets, therefore commands a higher price than some of the other towns on the peninsula.



3. Simon's Town is home to Boulder Beach with it's famous Penguins. There is a small public beach just off from Boulder's Beach that is used by the locals. The rocky surrounds make it perfect for bathing in the Indian Ocean and affords protection from the sharks and whales that frequent the bay.

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4. Noordhoek Farm Village has a great selection of shops, bars and restaurants and has some great evening entertainment. This place gets really busy with locals and it's easy to see why they hang out here.



5. Nearby to Noordhoek is Cape Point Vineyards with their gorgeous vineyard overlooking the Atlantic Ocean. On a Thursday they have their open markets. Arrive early, grab a bottle, and chill out on the lawns, taking in the views. Once the market stalls are set up, it's time to dig in and try local and international cuisines and snacks.



6. Cape Point National Park is where you can watch the Indian Ocean and Atlantic Ocean meet, and it really is a sight to behold. Cape Point gets quite busy especially during peak season and sunsets are the busiest time!



7. Hermanus is known as the entry point to the Garden Route and a great stop for a night or two to see this artistic town. It's also a great place to do land based whale watching or if you are feeling brave, take a shark cage diving expedition.

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8. Cape Agulhas is the most southerly point in Africa and a great photo op. Nearby Struisbaai is a great place to stay, with it's phenomenal beaches and it's famous resident, Parrie, the stingray that comes in to feed off the fisherman's scraps.



9. Bredasdorp has a fantastic maritime museum which showcases the years and years of shipwrecks and maritime history of South Africa!



10. The Winelands is the most popular part of the region and worth a visit. We would recommend a stay in Franschoek, dump the car and take one of the trams that operates across six routes for your wine tasting. Plan your route and pre-book your vineyard for lunch. They get incredibly busy and if you just try to rock up for lunch you may be turned away.

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
